Year 3 – Reflect, Rewind and Replay

This Unit of Work consolidates the learning that has occurred during the year. All the learning is focused around revisiting songs and musical activities, a context for the History of Music and the beginnings of the Language of Music.

- Sing in groups and hopefully learn to enjoy it!
- Play instruments within the song
- Improvisation using voices and instruments
- Learn more about composition in music and why it is important
- Share and perform the learning that has taken place
- Round up all the information learnt this year and discuss independently and within groups and appraise what they have listened to.

Key Knowledge

- Kenny Wheeler was born in 1930 in Toronto,
 Ontario, and began playing trumpet at age 12.
- He appeared with John Dankworth's orchestra at the 1959 Newport Festival and remained with that group until 1965.
- Folk music can come from any country in the world.
- It is **traditional music** that is sung or played, accompanied or unaccompanied.
- If vocal, it often tells us a story. That story can be about a real-life situation or a historical event.
